



Committee to Support US Trade Laws (CSUSTL) Urges Swift Approval of Greer USTR Nomination in Next Congress

THE COMMITTEE TO SUPPORT U.S. TRADE LAWS FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE (December 3, 2024):

On Thursday November 26, 2024, President-Elect Trump announced his intent to nominate Jamieson Greer to be the United States Trade Representative (USTR). Greer previously served as the Chief of Staff to USTR Ambassador Robert Lighthizer, is a member of the Executive Committee of the Committee to Support US Trade Laws (CSUSTL), and is currently a partner at the King & Spalding law firm in Washington.

“Over the past several years CSUSTL has served alongside Jamieson to promote the effective enforcement of the trade remedy laws needed to protect US workers and businesses,” said Thomas Beline, Chair of CSUSTL. He continued, “These laws are critical for maintaining the economic health of local communities across America. CSUSTL strongly supports the Greer nomination and urges Congress to swiftly approve him as USTR in the next Congress.”

Nathan Rickard, Vice-Chair of CSUSTL, said “There is considerable interest in how members of President-Elect Trump’s administration will shape the US trade agenda going forward, particularly given the aggressive attack by China, and others, upon the US economy with their illegal trade practices. Jamieson will be an informed and influential voice as the Trump administration navigates these difficult issues.”
